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Message from the Community Recovery Coordinator

Welcome to the latest edition of the River Murray Flood Community Newsletter.

The appointment of Johns Lyng Disaster Management Australia (DMA) as the coordinators of structural assessments and debris removal is welcome news. DMA representatives will be in touch with registered flood-affected residents to discuss their individual needs, so I take this opportunity to once again encourage you to register for clean-up assistance. To register call the State Relief and Recovery Infoline on 1800 302 787, open Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm, and open Saturday and Sunday via same day call back service.

Flood recovery community meetings are continuing with sessions in Meningie, Pompoota and Adelaide scheduled for April. These meetings have been largely information-based from State Government department and agencies, but these will gradually transition to more localised voices as community members begin to take a more prominent role in the recovery effort.

We are also in the process of drafting a community recovery plan. This plan will be created from the feedback we receive from River Murray communities in the weeks and months ahead. Information gathering exercises will be undertaken to ensure the community recovery plan is tailored to as many flood-affected people as possible. Details will be made available soon and I encourage you to participate.

Over 139,000 people registered for the first River Revival tourism voucher ballot held earlier this week. This was a phenomenal result and highlights how important our river regions are to South Australians and interstate tourists alike. Additional vouchers will be made available in future ballots and I hope to see similar registration numbers in these rounds.

While this boom and the traditional flocking to the river over Easter is welcome news, it emphasises the need for safety on the water. Restrictions are in place in the Lower Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Areas but there may be hazards in other locations. We've provided some helpful tips in this newsletter to ensure your time on the river is as safe and enjoyable as possible.

We will continue to provide up to date information on the flood recovery in future newsletters and online at sa.gov.au/floods. As always feel free to contact me directly with any flood-related issues you may have.

Green Industries SA announcement

Green Industries SA (GISA) has announced the appointment of Johns Lyng Disaster Management Australia (DMA) as the coordinators of structural assessments and debris removal.

DMA will provide registered property owners with a case manager to work through your specific situation and identify your unique needs.

You can expect to hear from a DMA representative from mid-April onwards.

To prepare for this next step with your case manager, please organise any new information you might have that will help DMA assess your needs, such as:

- any communication from your insurance company
- any identified hazards you are aware of on your property, like asbestos
- road access issues.

During your first call, DMA will gather as much information as possible to ensure you receive access to all the support you are eligible for. They will also book in a date for your structural assessment.

Kerbside collections and street waste clean-ups will be paused over the Easter long weekend, but will then continue until all flood-affected material and debris is removed.

You will receive an email about the next kerbside flood-affected material removal in your area, and you can also access current details on the <u>GISA</u> website.

DMA will be engaging local contractors to assist with the increased kerbside collections, and to co-ordinate free asbestos, sandbag and mud removal as part of the clean-up.

Vouchers for free flood-affected material disposal are still available, and you can find more details about this program on the <u>GISA website</u>.

Over 1000 flood-affected properties reconnected

SA Power Networks (SAPN) continues to reconnect electricity supply to customers along the River Murray.

More than 1,100 properties have now been reconnected.

Reconnections are on average occurring within approximately two days of

SAPN receiving a request from the customer's retailer. Some locations will take longer depending on local circumstances.

SAPN recommends customers have an electrician check their property's electrical circuits and obtain a certificate of compliance to confirm safety before contacting their retailer to organise reconnection.

With many people expected to return to properties over Easter, SAPN has allocated additional resources to assist with reconnections and has issued a reminder about ensuring property owners stay well clear of electrical infrastructure and engage a qualified electrician to undertake all electrical work.

Supporting flood-affected communities to build back better

To help aid flood recovery, the Department for Trade and Investment's Planning and Land Use Services (PLUS) division is investigating possible amendments to the Planning and Design Code.

Flood-affected councils throughout the Murraylands and Riverland, working with PLUS, have identified a number of improvements that could be made to the Code to help mitigate future flood risk and support resilient redevelopment, such as:

 More accurate finished floor levels to avoid inundation in future flood events

- Greater flexibility in building height allowances (this involves review of current policy that seeks to restrict building heights above ground level for amenity purposes)
- Types of suitable building materials for underfloor structures.

Data on floodwater levels in the recent 2022/23 event and the extent of inundation is currently being collated by government and will be considered in forming changes to the Code. That process would provide the opportunity for community consultation, especially in affected communities, to ensure their voices are heard.

Due to the urgency of providing clear rules to support flood-resilient redevelopment, the Code Amendment is expected to be initiated soon, confirming the scope of the changes. Guidelines and support material to outline the process for rebuilding in flood-affected areas, including design, materials, risk mitigation and approval processes to support communities are currently being developed.

In addition, the Minister for Planning has established the Housing and Construction Flood Recovery group to engage and identify key issues with industry and expedite flood recovery.

The group includes the Master Builders Association of South Australia, the Housing Industry Association, the Urban Development Institution of SA, Riverland and Murray Councils, the Local Government Association of South Australia, Property Council, SA Unions, local MPs and Community Recovery Coordinator, Alex Zimmermann, who is assisting with the government's wider recovery response.

This initiative will be supported by the creation of long-term housing and infrastructure regional plans across the River Murray to help affected communities rebuild.

The Minister for Planning and PLUS representatives have also met with local mayors this month to help address the region's long-term requirements.

Campground bookings available over Easter

Campground bookings for the upcoming Easter break have reached 80 to 100 per cent capacity at many popular sites.

There are still many campsites available to book, including some reopened after the Murraylands and Riverland floodwaters receded.

It's expected that up to 72 campsites will reopen and be available for Easter at Chowilla Game Reserve, Danggali Conservation Park, Murray River National Park and Loch Luna and Moorook Game Reserve.

Visitors to the parks are asked to make sure they observe and follow marked roads to the campgrounds. They are also reminded to watch out for fallen trees and limbs and to be careful while in and around the river, as many sandbars have shifted and moved after the recent floods.

Campers are also reminded that as of 12.01am on Thursday, 6 April small campfires will be allowed in National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) parks. For those parks where campfires are permitted please remember to bring your own wood as the collection of wood from parks is prohibited.

Campers looking for last-minute bookings during Easter can also still secure spots from Monday at parks including:

- Chowilla Game Reserve
- Danggali Conservation Park
- Loch Luna and Moorook Game Reserve
- Murray River National Park
- Ngarkat Conservation Park

Importance of river safety

Many River Murray communities are anticipating an influx of river users over the Easter long weekend and as a result of the first round of River Revival Vouchers.

Ensure you remain safe on the river by following some effective tips:

- Check conditions before entering the water
- Enter the water slowly, feet first
- Take care around crumbling riverbeds and slippery dam edges
- Avoid underwater obstacles such as rocks, branches, rubbish
- Take care when walking on unstable or slippery riverbeds
- Avoid crossing flooded waterways
- Avoid alcohol and drugs around water
- Always swim with a friend

Safety tips for operating a vessel on the River Murray:

- Don't go out if the conditions are hazardous.
- It is recommended to wear a lifejacket. Requirements regarding the wearing of lifejackets continue to apply on the River Murray.
- Check for hazards such as floating debris like tree branches before operating a vessel and continue to take extra care.

 Be aware that some hazards may still be just below the surface of the water or snagged. Take extra care and travel at a safe speed suited to the conditions.

CWMS assessment and recommissioning

Mid Murray Council are continuing works to recommission Community Wastewater Management Systems (CWMS) impacted by the River Murray flood event.

To prevent any damage to both private and public infrastructure flood-affected communities are reminded to turn off the power supply to any septic pump or grinder pump to prevent damage for when SAPN reconnects the electrical supply to the property.

Each recommissioned CWMS will be included in Mid Murray Council's High River Update. The power for each property system can then be turned on and operated.


Captain Proud back in business

Return of the Bunyip


The Murray Bridge Bunyip has returned and is ready to scare the socks off those who dare to disturb her slumber.

Taking care of others impacted by flooding

The impact of the River Murray flood event may differ across communities so it's important to know how to take care of others during the recovery phase. Wellbeing SA have outlined several tips to help the people around you who may need a greater level of assistance:

Let them know they are not alone

Reassure them that you are there for them and happy to listen. If you can, consider making a regular time to call or check in.

Offer practical support, if you are able

For example, ask if you can prepare a meal, offer to do a chore or errand, or ask what else might be helpful.

Let them know it's ok to need extra help and support

Ask them if they've considered accessing a support service. Offer to help connect them and ask them if there's anything you can do to make it easier to make contact.
