Message from the Community Recovery Coordinator

We're all looking forward to the Easter long weekend and with that comes an influx of visitors to the River Murray region. This will provide a welcome boost to flood-affected communities, but it's important to remain safe on the river. Please heed the safety messages included in this newsletter so we can all have an enjoyable and restful break and ensure we're not damaging levees and other infrastructure.

Trades and businesses along the river are being encouraged to register their interest in working with the clean-up contractor, Johns Lyng Disaster Management Australia. Local knowledge and expertise will be vital in the large scale clean-up effort, so I encourage anyone interested to <u>register here</u>.

Pop-up recovery centres have been confirmed for Morgan, Blanchetown, Swan Reach and Bowhill later this month (see article in this newsletter for details). Local residents and nearby community members are encouraged to attend these pop-up centres and access the many support and recovery services available to you. Ongoing recovery centres continue to operate in Berri, Mannum and Murray Bridge.

Open spaces and services continue to regularly be restored to flood-affected areas, from riverfront reserves to sewer systems. We will continue working to make sure our River Murray communities recover as quickly as possible.

We plan on releasing our community recovery plan survey next week. All survey responses will be considered when formulating your community recovery plan, a key document intended to identify what can be done to improve local flood resilience and life on the ground. More details will be made available after Easter and I encourage you to have your say.

Please enjoy this week's newsletter. Our aim is to keep you well informed about the recovery effort on a regular basis. If there is something you wish to see in future editions, or improvements we can make, please do not hesitate to provide your feedback via the link below. Marine safety over Easter

Marine Safety Officers will have an increased presence on the River Murray and other areas this Easter long weekend, as holidaymakers are urged to take care on the water.

An expected surge in visitors to these popular holiday spots, and the forecasted windy weather, has prompted warnings to all boaties to ensure they are equipped with the most appropriate safety tools.

Though the River Murray is returning to regular levels, boaties are reminded to take care on the water as conditions may have changed, including the potential for hazards and debris to create additional risks for water skiers.

Boat operators are also reminded to observe the four-knot speed restrictions in place within 50 metres of a person in the water or on an unpowered vessel such as a canoe, kayak or paddleboard.

A four-knot speed restriction, commonly referred to as a fast-walking speed, applies within 30 metres of another vessel that may be adversely impacted by wash, within 50 metres of a person in the water and 100 metres within a ferry crossing.

Where there is no speed limit, the skipper must always travel at a safe speed.

The importance of a properly fitted lifejacket is critical for all boaties and their passengers, including children.

Lifejackets are rated either Level 150, Level 100, Level 50, or Level 50S, based on how much buoyancy they provide.

Wearing a lifejacket is compulsory on all unpowered vessels, on vessels that are 4.8 metres or under in length and on jet skis and other personal watercraft.

To protect damaged levees as a result of the flood event between Mannum and Wellington, a four-knot speed limit applies to all vessels operating with 250 metres of any engaged levee.

Vessels must not be moored or secured in any way to an engaged levee, and mariners are advised to navigate the area with caution.

Everyone on the water has a responsibility to make sure all boaties get home safe

At 1:50pm on Friday, 31 March 2023, the Emergency Services (Lower Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Areas) Direction 2023 was revoked.

There are no longer restrictions in the Lower Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Areas enforced by the Emergency Services (Lower Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Areas) Direction 2023.

The Lower Murray Reclaimed Irrigation Area refers to the floodplain of the River Murray between the townships of Mannum and Wellington reclaimed for agriculture and animal husbandry irrigated from the River Murray.

Regulations, restrictions and requirements prior to the River Murray flood event continue to apply.

As aforementioned, to protect damaged levees as a result of the flood event between Mannum and Wellington, a four-knot speed limit applies to all vessels operating with 250 metres of any engaged levee.

Vessels must not be moored or secured in any way to an engaged levee, and mariners are advised to navigate the area with caution.

Community temporary toilet request

The State Government is currently providing temporary toilet facilities in various sites along the River Murray. While tourists will use these, they are primarily for residents who have not had their normal facilities reconnected at this stage. **We ask that you do not move these** as they are positioned to address community needs and have been organised with local councils. Flood clean-up trade registrations now open

Johns Lyng Disaster Management Australia (DMA), the contractor appointed to coordinate the River Murray flood clean-up, will be engaging local contractors to assist with increased kerbside collections, along with free asbestos, sandbag and mud removal.

Electricity reconnections continue

SA Power Networks has additional people deployed along the River Murray over the next few weeks to reconnect power for customers.

While it is acknowledged reconnection is unfortunately a long way off for some customers who have suffered significant inundation damage, more than 1,300 properties have now been reconnected.

Almost 90% of the network transformers disconnected along the river have been reconnected, meaning supply is available to the kerb.

Property owners are reminded that you need to lodge a reconnection request

via your retailer and if you have suffered any water inundation you will need an electrician to confirm power can be reconnected safely.



Locks reopen for River Murray traffic

Boat users can once again safely navigate South Australia's network of locks and weirs along the River Murray, with the structures reopening following their temporary closure in late 2022 during the peak of the floods.

Rising river levels saw SA Water close the lock chambers from Blanchetown's Lock One up to Lock Nine in Victoria, with people instead able to freely pass across the top of the adjacent weir structure during this time, without the need to access the lock chamber.


SA Water has recently safely completed all of the required mechanical and electrical testing required at each site, allowing each lock chamber to return to normal operation.

"Taking early action to close each of our locks allowed us to best protect the sites from any flood damage and enable us to reopen the locks as quickly as possible once water levels receded," SA Water's Senior Manager of River Murray Operations Garry Fyfe said.

"We thank everyone for doing the right thing and keeping outside the temporary buoy markings and abiding by speed restrictions put in place around locks and weirs throughout this rare natural event."

On behalf of the Murray-Darling Basin Authority, SA Water manages Locks One to Six in South Australia, Lock Seven at Rufus River and Lock Eight at Wangumma in New South Wales, as well as Lock Nine at Kulnine in Victoria.

SA Water sewer services restored in Mannum

SA Water's wastewater network in Mannum has now been fully restored for normal operations, following the temporary disconnection of services for low-lying local properties ahead of the River Murray floods.

127 SA Water customers had their wastewater services proactively disconnected from the utility's wider underground pipe network in December 2022, to stop flood inundation impacting the town's wider sewer system, reduce the risk of sewer overflows into the environment and best place services to be restored once floodwaters receded.

Throughout this period, affected properties were unable to discharge water from their toilets, showers or sinks. A further 61 customers were also identified early on as residing in flood-impacted areas of the town, but were able to continue discharging into the sewer network, following the use of temporary pumping and wastewater tanks put in place ahead of the flood peak.

SA Water's dedicated operational and stakeholder engagement teams worked with each impacted customer over recent months to provide individual support as needed, including providing bill relief towards their quarterly water and sewage charges, and the use of temporary shower and toilet facilities at its Mannum depot.

With flood levels now receded, SA Water has removed temporary bungs and fibreglass seals from all local customers' sewer connection points, including the Mannum Bowling Club and Pretoria Hotel.

Riverfront reserves reopen in Murray Bridge

Several riverfront reserves in the Murray Bridge Council area have reopened ahead of Easter.

Avoca Dell, Sunnyside, Thiele and Woodlane Reserves, along with Bells Landing have reopened with some restrictions.

Playgrounds remain closed at Thiele and Woodlane Reserves due to flood damage, while the boat ramp at Bells Landing also remains closed.

Outgoing Rural City of Murray Bridge CEO Michael Sedgman said the reopening of these reserves marked a significant milestone in the council's flood recovery plan.

"It's been a lot of work to get to this point, but we are extremely happy to be reopening the rest of our most popular riverfront reserves while the weather's still warm enough to enjoy them," he said.

"The safety of our community and our workers has been our top priority throughout the high river event and recovery process.

"We have been undertaking regular inspections and engaging qualified experts wherever necessary to determine the best way forward, while our open space and infrastructure teams have been working hard to clear debris and repair damage – and they've done a great job."

Mr Sedgman said the council's flood recovery focus had moved to Hume, Riverglen and Tumbella Reserves.

He also reminded river users to remain alert when on the water.

"Water levels have dropped and while it may look like things are returning to normal on the surface the landscape below has changed, so it's important to be aware of potential submerged objects and exercise caution on the river at all times," he said.


