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Message from Alex and Deb

Welcome to the latest edition of the River Murray Flood Community Newsletter. In a welcome boost to Mid Murray tourism operators, the South Australian Tourism Commission (SATC) are providing \$500,000 to help with staffing, marketing, event funding and other tourism areas. These businesses were some of the hardest hit throughout the flood, with some unable to participate in earlier versions of SATC's River Recovery Voucher Program. A reminder that kerbside collections of flood-affected materials will close on Friday, November 24 2023. Kerbside collections began in February this year, with almost 10,000 tonnes of flood-affected waste removed from the kerbside. To arrange a collection before the closure date, please call Johns Lyng Disaster Management Australia on <u>1800 418 491</u>. Only flood-affected materials are eligible for free removal under the program. If you are unable to place your flood-affected material on the kerbside prior to the closure date, contact Alex via the details below to discuss your circumstances. **Requests for kerbside collection after the 24th of November will only be accepted in exceptional circumstances**. With 2023 quickly drawing to a close, the clean-up program will pause over the holiday period to provide an important break to the community. Works will gradually draw to a close in December and resume in 2024. More information will be provided in the new year about the resumption of clean-up services. Congratulations to the recent graduates of the River Recovery: Intro to Hospo program run by Youth Options. A number of locals took up this opportunity to develop their hospitality skills, with all graduates successfully gaining employment after completing the program. While we continue with the flood recovery, The Bureau of Meteorology have announced they will now provide any future flood warnings for the River Murray in South Australia. River Murray communities will continue to receive early warning information and advice from local emergency services, but can now access the latest forecasts and warnings via the BOM Weather app and the Bureau's website. 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Update from Johns Lyng Disaster Management Australia

This month DMA have been busy working towards achieving recovery goals for registrants under the River Murray flood waste clean-up program. We continue to conduct assessments of damaged properties, provide works in the form of demolition and hazard reduction and the widespread clean-up of kerbside waste.

The clean-up has disposed of nearly 18,000 tonnes and diverted 47% from landfill under all phases of work, including kerbside and river clean-up, demolition and hazard reduction. This has helped the community on their way to recovery but we understand there is still a significant amount of work to go.

In response to the immediate needs of the affected region, our kerbside collections have intensified, addressing both general waste and material registered by program participants. A significant achievement is the disposal of almost 10,000 tonnes of flood-affected waste from kerbsides, with a substantial portion responsibly diverted from landfills.

Our scheduled demolitions have been executed efficiently, with over 134 structures demolished to date. As we approach the year-end and the upcoming high-activity summer period, demolitions remain a top priority for DMA.

We are proud to report that we are nearing completion of 40% of our hazard reduction works. Collaboration with program registrants has been vital, and our team is dedicated to ensuring that these works align seamlessly with their goals. We appreciate the patience of all registrants as we navigate the complexities of this crucial phase.

As we approach the conclusion of kerbside collections, we want to inform you that the current free kerbside collection service for flood-affected waste will end on Friday, November 24, 2023. To arrange or confirm a collection before this date, please contact DMA at 1800 418 491. If you are a registered participant seeking updates or considering opting into program works, we encourage you to reach out to DMA at 1800 418 491. Your engagement is pivotal in our collective efforts towards a successful recovery.

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River Recovery: Intro to Hospo Graduation

Participants of the River Recovery: Intro to Hospo program in Murray Bridge, run by Youth Options, celebrated their graduation on Thursday, 2 November.

With funding support provided by the Department of the Premier and Cabinet as part of the river recovery, the training program allowed participants to undertake a range of hospitality training courses including how to prepare and serve coffee, using hygienic practices for food safety, and providing responsible service of alcohol.

The cohort also undertook accredited training with Youth Options' partnered registered training organisation HITsa. Other soft skills training delivered were front of house table setting and service, the completion of a 'Do Food Safely' certificate, and a resume and career development session conducted by Hilary Healy from Apprenticeship Careers Australia, designed to help the job seekers identify better ways to construct a resume and cover letter.

A new addition to the River Recovery: Intro to Hospo program from previous programs was the addition of three weeks of supported work experience following the initial training. A number of employers in Murray Bridge and Tailem Bend were extremely supportive of the program, providing work experience to participants at multiple venues including:

- Mojo's Café
- Fasta Pasta
- The Riverside Hotel in Tailem Bend
- The Tailem Bend Hotel

Some participants asked for additional work experience shifts, which employers were happy to accommodate. All of the graduates secured employment following the completion of the program.

The graduation event was a perfect opportunity for participants to demonstrate their newfound skills by preparing, cooking, and serving food and coffee to their family, friends, and other graduation attendees.

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Mid Murray Tourism Recovery Fund

The South Australian Tourism Commission (SATC) are providing \$500,000 in support to Mid Murray River tourism operators impacted by the flood to support the return to full operations, staff upskilling, marketing activities and funding for events.

Eligible businesses include those located primarily in the Mid Murray Council region and low-lying neighbouring areas that were impacted.

The funding includes \$150,000 to be shared among five councils impacted by the flood to support new and emerging events - Mid Murray Council, Berri Barmera Council, Rural City of Murray Bridge, Renmark Paringa Council, and District Council of Loxton Waikerie. Additional funds will also be provided to the Mid Murray Council to support tourism recovery efforts.

A further \$300,000 will be allocated to support businesses significantly impacted by the floods, with grants of up to \$50,000 available through the Mid Murray River Tourism Business Support Program. **Applications are open until 5pm Friday, 24 November 2023.**

The remaining \$50,000 will be used by the SATC to provide support to impacted businesses, through a combination of marketing and media spend.

The \$500,000 Mid-Murray recovery funding is part of the \$4.6 million river recovery plan, which also includes the <u>Rise Up for our River marketing</u> <u>campaign and the River Revival Voucher program.</u>

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Bureau of Meteorology to expand flood forecasts and warnings for South Australia

The Bureau of Meteorology (the Bureau) will now provide flood warnings for minor, moderate and major flood conditions for the River Murray in South Australia, aligning with the national warning service.

The South Australian State Emergency Service (SASES) will continue to provide impact-based flood warning advice for the River Murray in SA and messaging to local communities.

The warning service, which came into effect on Thursday, 26 October 2023, has been developed in collaboration with the South Australian Department for Environment and Water (DEW), the Murray-Darling Basin Authority, SASES, SA Water and councils.

Planning for the transition was well underway prior to the flood but was put on hold while the agencies responded to the flood event.

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Habitat for Humanity lend a helping hand

Habitat for Humanity SA volunteers continue to assist flood-affected communities, removing vegetation and relocating flood-damaged furniture to the kerbside for collection.





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Flood grants for small businesses

<u>Small business flood recovery grants</u> of up to \$50,000 are available to assist with the re-instatement and clean-up of eligible small businesses and repair flood damaged assets. The definition of a sole trader small business has changed, to those that derive at least 50% of the income from the business.

The <u>Industry Support Grant</u> is a \$10,000 payment for an eligible business that usually operates in the affected area and has experienced a downturn of 30% or more in revenue over three consecutive months, up to and including April-June 2023. This grant may cover your usual business costs or used to make changes to your business so it can operate effectively post-flood.

You have until 31 December 2023 to complete your applications for the above grants.

Eligibility includes businesses that have been operational for less than one year, if the business can demonstrate that income received was 30% less than anticipated.

If you or someone you know is feeling overwhelmed and struggling to cope, reach out to local services that can provide mental health and wellbeing support – they're here to help.

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


The Department of Primary Industries and Regions (PIRSA) continue to provide regular updates through their flood recovery update web page.
